Trinidad State – Our Promise

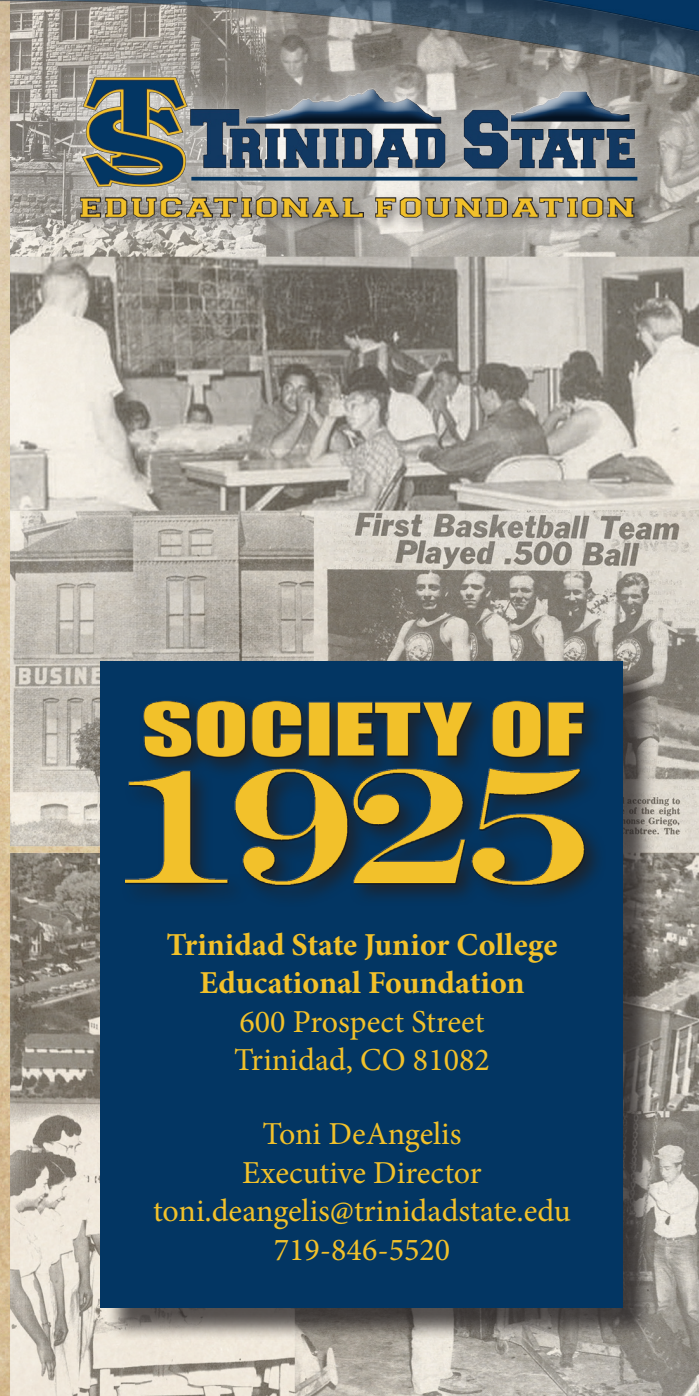

GOV. MORLEY SIGNED TRINIDAD JUNIOR COLLEGE BILL TODAY

SIGNED BILL WITH PEN OF
REP. RALPH WEINBROER

The Trinidad Junior College bill which passed the house Friday morning was signed by Governor Morley at 9:30 this morning, the governor using the pen of Representative Ralph Weinbroer who piloted the bill to its final passage in the house. This is the bill originally introduced in the senate by Senator Sam Freudenthal.

This bill provides for the establishment of a junior college in Trinidad and carries an appropriation of \$2000 for improvement of a site to be donated. The bill was one of two junior college bills passed and held over until the last hours of the run-over session of the legislature. Representatives Weinbroer and Martinez were most active in achieving the success of the bill in its final rounds.

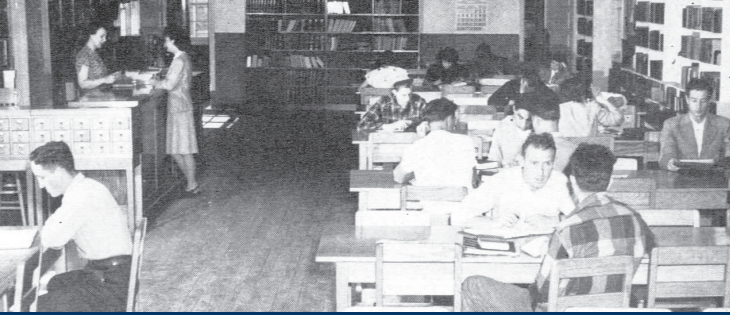
Denver, April 20.—Governor Morley today signed into law a bill which provides for the establishment of junior colleges at Trinidad and Grand Junction. These two bills provided appropriations of \$2,500 each for improving the college sites. The other bills passed were as follows: The measure appropriating \$15,000 for moving a strip of land for the state teacher's college at Greeley.

The measure permitting county commissioners of counties having more than 10,000 population to accept patients paying for services in county hospitals. The bill appropriating \$25,700 for the Colorado National Guard.

Denver, April 20.—Pears that are heavy with the Colorado national guard might have to be curtailed thru lack of sufficient funds were reported this morning when word was received by the guard headquarter that \$101,122 has been appropriated to Colorado by the war department for this purpose during the fiscal year 1925.

When Trinidad State Junior College opened in April of 1925, it became Colorado's first public two-year institution. With only 37 students, the College initially shared space and faculty with Trinidad High School.
