ADMISSIONS PROCEDURES AND TRANSFER INFORMATION

Regular admission for transfer students requires the student to be in good standing at the institution from which s/he is transferring. Transfer students may be granted regular admission by completing the WNMU undergraduate application form and providing appropriate documentation of one of the following:

- 1. ACCUPLACER placement exam; or
- 2. Submission of a transcript showing completion of college level writing and/or mathematics courses with a grade of C or better; or
- 3. Achievement of an ACT sub-score of 21 or better (or SAT equivalent of 500) in math, English and social science. ACT/SAT must have been taken in the past 5 years, or;
- 4. Submission of a transcript showing completion of an undergraduate degree from an accredited institution recognized by CHEA (Council on Higher Education Accreditation).

All transfer applicants who have completed less than 24 hours must submit an official high school transcript or official GED certificate.

It is the policy of Western New Mexico University to accept transfer credits from other regionally accredited colleges and universities.

Transfer credit may be awarded when the following conditions are met:

- 1. The student must be awarded "final" admissions status.
- 2. The course carries degree credit at the transferring institution.
- The student was not suspended from a college or university at the time the course was taken.

Courses transfer from other institutions at the level offered at those institutions. Hours transferred from TSJC cannot be used for upper division (300-400) hours.

A transfer student must complete a minimum of thirty credit hours at WNMU, at least twenty of which must be upper division coursework, and six credit hours in the major at WNMU.

Attached as an appendix to this agreement are worksheets detailing for students specifically how an A.A.S. or A.S. degree in criminal justice at TSJC articulates with a B.A.S. degree in criminal justice at WNMU.
